A MESSAGE FROM THE COMMANDANT OF THE MARINE CORPS

For over 40 years, in peacetime and in war, and at every level of command, he has been a consummate leader, warrior, and professional. His wife, Barbara, has been a dedicated partner during this remarkable career, contributing her considerable talents as a staunch advocate for Marine families as well as for the National Military Family Association. This exceptional couple will be sorely missed.

Gen William L. "Spider" Nyland's experience as a joint officer, a Marine air-ground task force officer, and as a commander at all levels of command is superb preparation for his duties as our new Assistant Commandant. We will all benefit from his recent experiences as Deputy Commandant for Aviation and for Programs and Resources, as well. His wife, Brenda, brings her own considerable talents as a dedicated supporter for Marine families. Their qualifications and enthusiasm for this important position will benefit the Corps immensely.
